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
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

It's a Dry, Dry World!



You may recall a late November, 2007 issue of *National Geographic* magazine with a provocative picture of three pairs of legs, each pair standing in its own plastic tub. The article accompanying the photo describes Australia's extreme drought and the equally extreme measures employed to minimize personal water use. Families shower together wearing bathing suits, while standing in washtubs to capture all the water that normally would disappear through the drain to save every drop of this precious, indispensable, and rare resource. This is just another reminder that we are in a global water crisis.

Although over 71 percent of the earth's surface is covered with water, only three percent is fresh water, and even less is

available to Californians. The California Department of Water Resources informs us that California is in the third year of drought. In the February 2009 Governor's Proclamation, Governor Schwarzenegger declared a state of emergency due to the "conditions of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property...caused by the current and severe drought conditions and water delivery restrictions." The sobering facts include last winter's snow pack being 39 percent below normal, rainfall measurements that are 24 percent below normal, and a state population that has grown by nine million residents since our state's last drought in 1991.


Emergency conditions reflect the adverse impact on the environment, economy, wildlife, communities, and recreation as a result of California's ongoing water shortage. The state's agricultural center, the San Joaquin Valley, is receiving 10 percent of its requested water allocation request. This dramatically impacts the ability of farmers to grow food, further impacting food prices and the income of many people. Increases in customers' water rates, either to encourage conservation or to react to increased costs associated with acquiring supplemental water sources, is another common drought outcome. The coming fall presents an elevated risk for catastrophic fires, reflecting the cumulative impacts of a third successive dry year.

In our commitment to world class education opportunities, the Orange County Department of Education has partnered with the University of California, Irvine along with business, education, and water agency partners to create a profound lifelong learning experience for Orange County students. Now in its second year, the Water Innovation Now (WIN) combines academics, creativity, and technology to develop an ethic of water conservation with our youth. We believe that our students will share their learning experiences with their families and will become the innovators who create effective mechanisms to conserve and effectively use this precious resource.

We invite you to attend the free Water Innovation Now (WIN) family festival at the Orange County Department of Education on Saturday, October 17, 2009, to kick off a year of learning about water and its connections to health, environment, industry, agriculture, and policy. We encourage you to join us and enjoy water-related learning activities and games. Families and educators will obtain further information about Orange County's unique academic contest dedicated to encouraging K-12 students to become young water innovators.

Productive Summer

Special Education Summer School (i.e., Extended School Year) was very successful throughout OUSD this summer. The Canyon Hills program for severely disabled students was four weeks long. Each week at Canyon Hills focused on a unifying theme which propelled students to further their IEP goals. The themes were Animal Week, Patriot Week, Water Week, and Hawaiian Week, respectively. It was a productive summer with students progressing on their goals.

This summer's special education high school program at El

Modena, Orange High School, and Villa Park High School included two sessions of summer school. Each session lasted three weeks. These sessions were designed to assist high school students who may need credits for graduation and/or to master course content. We had 131 students enroll in one or both summer school sessions as required by the their IEPs.

The middle school, elementary school, and preschool summer school program was also required for some special education students. It was held for four weeks. This year, we had 155 preschool / kindergarten students, 160 elementary students, and 41 middle school students who participated in a four-week program. The middle school classes were held at El Modena and Villa Park High School. Elementary and Preschool classes were held at Villa Park Elementary School and McPherson Magnet School.

Finally, the Adult Transition Program was also held for four weeks over the summer and had 16 students attending the Parkside campus. The students continued to work on domestic and life skills and often participated in the community and rode the buses of the Orange County Transportation Authority.

Magic Book Garden Preschool Reading Skills



Along with reading aloud to your preschooler every day, there are a few fun and easy activities that you do to greatly enhance the likelihood of your child's reading success in kindergarten and first grade. These activities are meant to teach a skill called *phonemic awareness*.

Phonemic awareness is the ability to hear and manipulate the individual sounds that make up spoken words. These are auditory activities and can be performed anywhere: in lines at the supermarket, in the car when you're stuck in traffic or when taking walks together. I used to play these games with my children in the swimming pool.


Chant and sing nursery rhymes. Say three words, such as *cat, mat, mug.* Your child will pick the word that doesn't rhyme. Or, say three words, such as *bug, cat, baby,* and have your child say the word that starts with a different sound.

Focus on Sounds

Invite your child to guess the word when you divide it up into the sounds, such as */mmmmaaaaaaannnnn/, man.* Or, ask your child what sound—not letter—they hear at the beginning of *man, moon, monkey* and so on.
