Principal's Message

Working Together to Promote Positive Student Behavior By Mrs. Little

A personal phone call from the principal can strike fear into any parent's heart. No parent likes to hear that their child has received a disciplinary referral to the principal. If you should receive that phone call, don't panic. We share a common goal, shaping your child's behavior to optimize success at school and beyond.

Just as children are learning how to read, write, and solve mathematical problems at school, they are also learning what behaviors lead to positive outcomes, and what behaviors create negative situations for themselves and others. For some students establishing good behavioral habits at school will come easily, while for others it will be challenging. When parents and school staff reinforce similar expectations for appropriate behavior, we optimize student success.

As a part of Villa Park Elementary Positive Behavior Intervention System we teach all students to strive to be PAWS-itive. This means:

<u>Personal Best-</u> put forth effort in work, demonstrate honesty and integrity, use technology appropriately, and follow the dress code.

<u>A</u>ct Responsibly- follow school rules for where to be on campus, bring and use materials appropriately, and avoid disrupting others. **W**ork and Play Safely –follow rules for safe play and movement, keep hands feet and objects to oneself, avoid physical aggression (even playfully), and never bring unsafe items (including toy weapons) to school.

<u>Show</u> Respect- follow adult directions at all times, and demonstrate respect to everyone- avoid profanity, inappropriate images or gestures, teasing, insults, exclusion, and intimidation.

We are grateful for the work you do as parents to support our efforts to teach positive behavior at school. Even small gestures, like ensuring that students sit down in their assigned spots on the playground in the morning, make a difference. For young children obeying authority, doing non-preferred tasks, accepting frustration, and waiting to receive attention do not come easily; praise your children when they do these things! Monitoring your children's technology use and limiting the types of media to which they are exposed also helps foster positive behavior that carries over to school.

Children following our positive standards receive classroom and school praise including "PAWS" Bucks. When children fail to follow the PAWS 'itive standards they are likely to receive a behavioral referral. Behavior referrals can fall into two categories "minors" and "majors". A "minor" should be viewed as a "teachable moment". Consequences are short term and do not progress unless there is a pattern of continued poor behavior. "Majors" are more significant behavioral incidents which are likely to have caused a safety hazard, harm or hurt feelings, or to have undermined the trusting relationship between the student and adults at school. When a child receives a "major" we have three goals:

- Help the child understand the negative impact of the behavior to self and others.

- Discourage the repetition of the behavior by assigning a consequence.
- Guide the child toward a positive replacement behavior that will be expected in the future.

By discussing these three elements with your child, you can help us prevent further incidents. If a student repeats a "major" offense the consequences will increase according to a predictable sequence found in our <u>Student Handbook</u> (p 7). Students who receive repeated "majors" are likely to need additional follow-up incentives, or interventions at school and your support at home.

Our goal for all students is self-directed "PAWS-itive" behavior. By working as a team we can support your child and, all children at this school as they strive to meet this goal.

Academic Intervention and Support for all Students

When students struggle to meet academic benchmarks, it is our goal to offer them additional support. Often this support takes the form of the teacher pulling the child aside individually or in a small group within the classroom to break down key concepts or review important skills. Sometimes extra practice and review is accomplished using online software programs such as Lexia, which strengthens reading skills. Occasionally, additional support staff at school such as our Education Specialist, Mrs. Smith, or Response to Intervention Teacher, Mrs. Arriola, will support struggling students by pulling them out of class

briefly to work with them in a small group. Other times, under the supervision of the teacher, we enlist the help of volunteers or peer tutors for students who need extra skills practice and review.

In addition to these classroom interventions, a few times throughout the year we are able to offer before school or after school intervention classes targeted to specific student needs in reading, math, or language. These classes are not homework help. Students are selected for these classes based on the space available and a comprehensive look at student academic performance in the targeted areas. Parents are informed when their students have been identified to participate in these classes. Parents should talk to the teacher if they feel their child needs this kind of help, but

has not yet been invited to participate. Please understand that sometimes students may be "wait-listed" for intervention classes based on the number of spaces available and the academic needs of each student.

If you have concerns about your child's progress, talk with your child's teacher. She likely has suggestions to offer and can share any interventions that are already in place. By working together we can help every child to achieve his or her potential.

Morning Drop Off

Mornings can be challenging for all families. For your student's safety and educational success, we ask that you establish a routine of dropping students off at school regularly no earlier than 7:40 and no later than 7:55 AM.

- School gates open and staff supervision begins at 7:45 AM. Students dropped off before that time are at risk because during an unsupervised wait, they may become bored and engage in problematic behavior. Children who are waiting before the 7:45 bell are now being asked to wait in the area directly in front of the school on the green lines. Help us to start each child's day in a safe and positive environment by avoiding early drop offs.
- The school bell rings at 8:00 AM and students are escorted promptly to their classrooms. Students should be lined up on the playground when the 8:00 AM bell rings. Students who arrive to campus at that time are likely to be tardy to class and may be less focused and organized for their day. Plan to arrive at school by 7:55 on regular days. In inclement weather; additional time will be needed. Thank you for helping us to start every child's day out right.

Getting out the door in a timely fashion is a challenge for any family. Establishing routines such as laying out clothes and supplies the night before can help. By helping your children develop a morning routine that gets them to school on time, you are setting them up for success throughout the day!


